- Ways to present social engineering attacks
- Leg Hall fire event currently no COOP Plan
- COOP Planners need to educate and promote Family Emergency Planning to staff
- Add cyber element to individual agency COOP drills
- Create 1-page document identifying available resources, presentations, etc to be sent to Organization Heads to promote a top-down support structure
- Suggest all agencies practice Notifind messaging now since Paris attacks are fresh in everyone's minds
- Send follow-up communications to the OMB State outage email sent to all employees to remind agency staff to update contact information with COOP Planners for notification purposes




- Phishing Lessons Learned
- 1) Ensure you know who the sender is and contact them to determine the legitimacy of the email
- 2) Report any suspicious emails to your Information Security Officer (ISO) and/or the IT Service Desk
- 3) Do not provide user credentials either electronically or verbally to ANYONE
